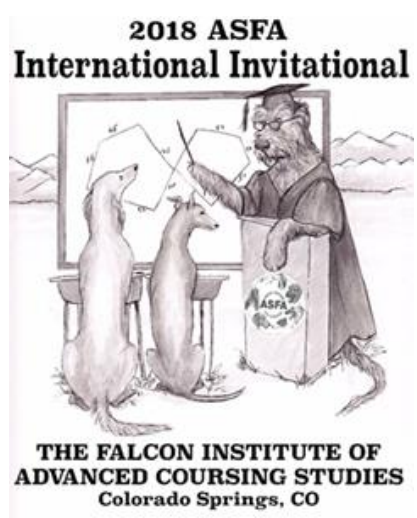

I have many goals for next year. Here are two of them:

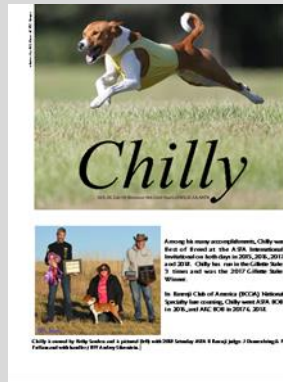

Gary Forrester Award

Nominations must be received by December 15, 2018

(Note: The deadline for nominations has been extended).

How to nominate

Please submit the name of the person that you feel is deserving of the Gary Forrester Award, along with a list of their accomplishments. Include positions held in club(s) and/or committees that they served on. Please include a photo of your nominee, if you have one. Nominations should be sent to ASFA at rundogs2017@gmail.com no later than November 30, 2018.

Who to nominate

The committee will give preference to people who have been active and involved with ASFA lure coursing for five years or more and who have made a long-lasting, significant, and positive impact on the sport and/or association. The committee will consider, but not be limited to, the following areas of involvement: a) lure field trial participation, b) judging, c) active leadership at the local level-clubs and trial activity, d) ASFA administration, e) promoting ASFA and the growth of the sport, f) improving the quality of trials, and g) exceptional performance or effort in any other area.

Ideally, the committee will name one recipient per year, but in some years there may be two or more equally deserving candidates, such as a husband/wife team to share the award.

A person who is not currently a member of the ASFA Board or an active ASFA committee chair will be given strong preference. This award should not appear as an "in house" honor.

Purpose of the Award

To memorialize Gary Forrester's exemplary contributions and dedication to the advancement of lure coursing and the ASFA. The ASFA will give recognition to individuals who are deserving of this Award of Excellence.

When the award is announced

The award will be announced at the ACoD (Annual Convention of Delegates) in March 2019 and will be posted on the ASFA website.

Selection Committee and Criteria

A committee of five people (appointed by the ASFA Board with consideration to committee members spread evenly across the country, will make the choice independently from the Board.

Paragon is providing instruction on the use of the new program. **Paragon will host a hands-on Webinar to show everyone how this works.** Target date is November 30th.

The **41st ASFA International Invitational**, held in Falcon, Colorado on October 13 – 14, 2018, was an event of extremes. The first day could have not been planned any better. Temperatures were in the high 60's with sunshine that was perfect for the hounds and their owners. Kent Standerford raised our spirits as he sang both the American and Canadian National Anthems. We witnessed many great runs, with 78 hounds competing, representing 14 breeds.

The Gillette Stake included 10 breeds competing in four courses. It was judged by Scott Hurlbert (left) and Jason Dannenbring (right). The first run resulted in a 3-way tie between IG "Cirrus", Ibizan Hound "Fin", and Irish Wolfhound "Woopie".

LINKS TO THE PAST

“Links to the Past” is ASFA’s most unique trophy. The “Links to the Past” chain symbolically links each Best in International Invitational [BII] winner to the previous BII winners. The chain was introduced in 2007. The name of each BII winner up to that time was engraved on a link of the chain going all the way back all the winner of the first II in 1978. In each succeeding year, the name the BII winner has been added to the chain, link by link. Also, each BII hound’s owner is awarded a “take home” pendant to commemorate their hound’s achievement.



The inspiration for ASFA’s “Links to the Past” chain is the historic chain that commemorates the winners of the Waterloo Cup, the greatest coursing event in England. Accordingly, ASFA’s “Links to the Past” also honors the old-world coursing traditions upon which our sport is based.

The “Links to the Past” chain is a work of fine craftsmanship. Made entirely of sterling silver, it consists of two chains of 25 links each. The chains are joined at the ends to an oval plate that is etched with the words “BEST IN INTERNATIONAL INVITATIONAL”. Suspended from that plate is a medallion. The image on the medallion is the ASFA logo. Each individual feature of logo was created, then assembled by the hand of a master craftsman.



“Links to the Past” would not have become a reality without the extraordinary efforts of the following individuals:

- The persistent leadership of Jack Helder;
- Early support and encouragement of Ian Davies and Les Pekarsky;

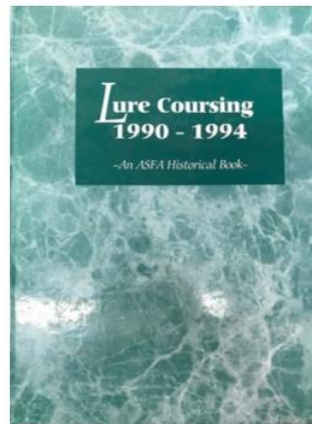
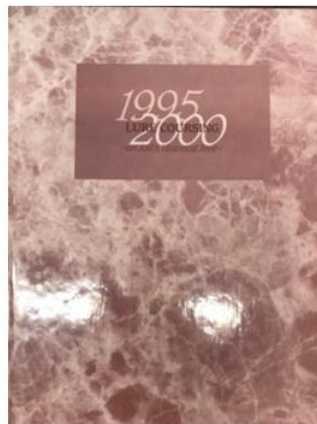
- Kathy Nelson’s skills, expertise, endless hours of work on the chain, and power of persuasion that brought master engraver Dmitri Pavlov on board.
- Dedicated fundraising of Dean Wright and Jack Helder, which brought out the generosity and support of individuals, clubs and regions for this costly project.

The Waterloo Cup Lancashire, England 1836-2005

In its heyday, the Waterloo Cup was England’s “Blue Riband [ribbon] event of the coursing year”. And coursing was a *national passion*. Tens of thousands of spectators would come to watch as a field of 64 Greyhounds coursed hare over 3 days in single-elimination competition. Carrier pigeons would convey the results from the field to major cities across England. And when news of the final winner reached London, the Stock Exchange would close down for the day. The greatest of the Waterloo Cup winners would go on to become household names. The very best of them were invited to meet the queen at Windsor Castle.



The Waterloo Cup saw vast social and cultural changes during its 169- year history. Spectators turned away from coursing and embraced other sports. Hare coursing eventually lost all public support and was finally banned in 2005.

This article was written in response to last issue's query: "How do you prepare your hounds for their first formal competition?"

So, you would like to get a sighthound to lure course and, hopefully, finish its FCh, and then its LCM. The following are items that you should be concerned with and follow to achieve the goal of owning an LCM sighthound:

1. 80% of a hound's ability to lure course is hereditary. If you want a good lure coursing hound, get one that is out of a good lure coursing pedigree.
2. In picking the right puppy from the litter, take the one that is the most playful. Put a garbage bag in with them- they will have a tug of war with it. Pick the one with the longest attention span, the one that plays with it the longest.
3. Pick a male if you want the best odds. Males can course all year long at full potential. Females come into season once or twice each year, and that throws them out of competition for four to twelve weeks.
4. After you pick your puppy and take him home, play with him occasionally with a sock pulled on a string attached to a fishing pole.
5. If you are at a trial when he reaches four to six months of age, run him on a straight-away ONLY ONCE!
6. Take him to trials and let him watch (ONLY!). A lot of puppies are over-practiced and become possessive of the lure or start cutting at an early age. Or, they will lose interest. You want your puppy to be excited about running and to see others doing it. The more trials you go to without letting him run (except for #5), the better. Hopefully, with great enthusiasm he will await the day that he becomes a year old and may compete in an ASFA trial.

7. Practice him again at nine months of age, on a course up to 600 yards with mild turns. He should complete as much of a course as you allow him to run. Make sure you praise him!
8. At eleven months of age, run him on a complete course at a practice or after a trial. Run him once by himself, let him rest, then run him with another hound. This is the most critical test in his career. At this time, also, an important factor is lure operation. The lure must be run for *him*, forgetting the other dog is there. Consider the other hound another critical factor. It must be a 120% enthusiastic hound on the lure. Preferably it will be the same breed as your hound (do not use Whippets or Greyhounds with slower breeds). This hound must be steadfast on the lure, ignoring the pup if he tries to play.
9. At one year of age, enter your hound in its first trial. (*Author's note: The age a puppy should enter its first trial is a very controversial issue. I have always entered my hounds at one year. However, a great number of people feel that depending on the breed and temperament of the individual hound, waiting until they are two to three years of age is better.*) Know your competition. It is important to run him with hounds who will not interfere. If you do not know all the Open Dogs, pull him on Saturday. Watch the dogs run on Saturday and, if they all run clean, enter yours on Sunday. Pull him if he ever gets drawn with a hound that is going to course or interfere with him. With most hounds, it is difficult to "undo" what such interference does to the mind of a young hound.
10. Hopefully, everything went well, and your hound is pointed and well on his/her way to a FCh.
11. Oh, I forgot to mention, you also have to pray before and after each of these steps.
12. A lot of luck also comes in handy.
13. Now for the controversial part! I saved it for the #13
Picking a breed. The following are the percentages of the ten sighthound breeds that I have seen practice and eventually become competent lure coursing hounds.

Afghan Hound- 60%
 Basenji- 40%
 Borzoi- 60%
 Greyhound- Track 90%; AKC 40%
 Ibizan- 80%
 Irish Wolfhound- 30%
 Pharaoh Hound- 70%
 Saluki- 65%
 Scottish Deerhound- 65%
 Whippets- 90%

If you really want a hound to run, get a track Greyhound or a Whippet. (*This could be another whole article!*)

These are only my feelings about this subject. Although I have had a great deal of experience in practicing and finishing hounds to their LCM, my thoughts, like anyone else's, are not gospel.

INTERFERENCE

"Articles from the Archives"

What is "interference"?

Webster's Collegiate Dictionary says, "to collide; clash." This brief and to-the-point definition will serve us well in judging the coursing hound's performance in a lure field trial.

It is my opinion that there are four main types of interference witnessed on the coursing field which affect the successful running of a course. Our present rules are a sincere effort on the part of the committees to lay down ways to deal with such incidents when they occur, so that our trials can have more meaningful results.

1. We have the unintentional clash or crash of two or more hounds in their eagerness and concentration on the pursuit, forcing a turn in direction and an unavoidable collision. If the hounds that collide immediately take up the pursuit without showing animosity to their coursing mates, the judges should not penalize any of them for interfering. We can say it was an unavoidable accident – caused by the intense concentration of the hounds on their work.
2. We are pestered with the hound that playfully interferes with its coursing mates. This is an *intentional interference* and, in all cases, should be penalized. How severely will depend upon the reaction of any hounds involved.

A good, clean-running hound *can* be literally ruined for running in trials by such a "playful one." Usually there are one or both of the following results brought about by the "playful" experience on the coursing field. Some hounds, after being molested by the "player," will be reluctant to take the lead in a course, but will hedge and lay back, not really concentrating on the lure, watching with one eye for another "playful one" to come barging up.

Other hounds will resent the playful interference, lash out at the provoker and keep on with the pursuit of the lure. Such hounds are too often disqualified for allegedly being involved in a vicious attack, when nothing more than a protest has been made by the hound being

annoyed. However, if the response is more than a signal of protest - that is, if the molested hound turns and attacks, breaking for a spell his pursuit of the lure and becoming involved in a hassle – then he must be penalized, either dismissed or disqualified depending upon whether a real act of aggression or viciousness has been committed.

The necessity of making decisions on this type of interference makes it mandatory that our judges be experienced dog-handling people, or persons who seriously try to understand the temperament of the running hound, what kind of temperament is acceptable and what type is not.

Without this type of person doing the judging, our trials' biggest mistakes are going to be made in reaching *just* decisions. Our rules can be better, and will be made more explicit as experience reveals the road for us; but the rules adopted in 1977 *are our rules until May 1, 1978*, and we must make the best of them. The better we understand the coursing hounds and their work, the better will be our decisions, and so will be the future rules upon which we decide.

3. Outright aggression is the third type of interference – a vicious display of an aggressive desire to fight one or more hounds in a course, losing all concentration toward the lure. Such animals should be *immediately disqualified*. Owners of such hounds should not re-enter them in any licensed trial until they set out on a serious effort to rehabilitate these hounds and cure their affliction, according to the rules and a sportsmanlike attitude.

A coursing hound's disposition is *not* a temperament which allows it to fight its coursing mate. Hounds that persistently display this trait are deviating from the standard as much as one without teeth!

4. The bumper or crowder does not come along often, but occasionally we see one who deliberately crowds or bumps his coursing mate. This hound's habit usually does not last long. He either gets thrown for a loop or becomes involved in a hassle that leads directly to disqualification. But, because the crowder doesn't last long as a crowder does not mean that we should close our eyes to it. Dismiss them, and, of course the owners will know why. They can break their dogs of the habit or, sure enough, a hassle and disqualification are just around the corner.

There have been occasions where judges have disqualified hounds for cause, and have thereupon suffered abuse, insults and curses by the owners of the disqualified hound. We should all remember that behavior of this

type can disqualify the owner also, with the result that such persons are thereafter unable to enter any other hound he or she may own.

Most people who course *do* abide by the decision made by various officials on the field and avoid displaying their disappointments. A hound that gets dismissed or disqualified is not condemned to death but has been placed in a position where it cannot do harm, either grave or minute, to other hounds.

Coursing is providing us with the means to test the *temperament* of our hounds. In return, we should heed the warnings and decisions not only to improve an individual hounds, but to base our program of breeding on those hounds whose dispositions are as near faultless as can be. This is a side-effect of coursing, which, if used correctly, can hasten the elimination of any incompatibility in the coursing hounds. Let all of us – judges and participants alike – be constructive and objective about the interferer; judge it fairly and, if necessary, penalize the dog on the basis of performance in line with the rules.
